

How Much Time?

Wind Cave is great, but you don't really want to budget a ton of time for it (unless you want to do a few cave tours). You're better off getting up to Custer State Park to do some hiking and Mount Rushmore, and the abun-

dance of other outdoor opportunities you have in western South Dakota.

And while the hiking is fine, you come here for what's below the earth, not what's above it (even though it's a fantastic wild-life viewing park too).

- Reservations are required for Wild Cave and Candlelight tours (by phone 605.745.4600, up to one month in advance).
- Backpacking is limited to the park's northwest corner.
